EIA for Proposed Ending of Service Contracts for Targeted Sexual Health Promotion/Education: Impact on Equality Groups

The services affected by proposed changes are primarily targeted at groups of people/communities with protected characteristics under the Equality Act 2010. Due to the nature of these services, it is likely that there may be an impact on at least one or more of the Equality Groups. Organisations potentially affected may also deliver other services that are not commissioned by Derby City Council. The ending of service contracts for targeted sexual health promotion/education may therefore potentially affect the provider's ability to deliver those services not commissioned by Derby City Council.

Scale of any negative impact:

This document summarises the impact that potential ending of service contracts for targeted sexual health promotion/education would have on each specific Equality Group. This has been done by:

- Looking at the service according to the support provided to the main Equality Group
- If a service provides a significant level of support for a second Equality Group then it will be listed under both Equality Groups
- Capturing the impact that ending of Derby City Council service contracts for targeted sexual health promotion/education will have on Equality Groups accessing other services provided by the affected organisation but not commissioned by Derby City Council.

Scale of any negative impact:

Based on the budget proposals set out in the public consultation, the ending of service contracts for targeted sexual health promotion/education are likely to have a negative impact on people from the identified Equality Groups. The extent of this impact will depend on any mitigating action taken by the Council or organisation affected.

Derbyshire Friend has explicitly stated that the ending of the Derby City Council service contract would destabilise the charity significantly and in turn, it would no longer be financially viable for the charity to continue.

• Identity, confidence, self-esteem and self-worth
• Isolation, bullying & harassment
• Lack of appropriate sexual health information for young people in the LGBT community and reluctance to access mainstream sexual health services
• Safeguarding and sexual exploitation
• Mental health issues including depression, self-harm and eating disorders and suicide risk

Loss of these services will have a significant negative impact on young people as it will potentially reduce awareness and knowledge around sexual health, reduce opportunities to sign post and access sexual health services and increase the chance of risk taking behaviour among young people.

Personal development and educational attainment

The EIA team also acknowledge the wider potential for negative impact on young people from the loss of local specialist education, support and advice around broader health and wellbeing issues. There are no other specialist LGBT young people services in Derby and loss of these services would result in young people being forced to travel to Chesterfield, Nottingham or Burton-upon-Trent to access equivalent service provision.

Specialist Training

In addition to this, Derbyshire Friend also provide bespoke and specialist training around young people LGBT awareness for Derby adoption and fostering services by regularly holding education and training sessions for staff and prospective carers. All new foster carers receive LGBT training and there is currently no other organisation in Derby that would be able to

Older People: Derbyshire Friend provides specialist support for the LGBT community aged 50 years and over. This includes group support and one-to-one sessions aimed at improving sexual health information, building confidence and reducing isolation, supporting issues around mental health and identity and supporting those people who may be going into residential care. Members of the LGBT community are at increased risk of depression, stress, anxiety, self harm, eating disorders and suicide along with other mental health issues. It is also more likely that they will experience discrimination, prejudice and engage in risk taking sexual behaviour but they are much less likely to access mainstream sexual health services. Derbyshire Friend work with Derbyshire Healthcare Foundation Trust to provide a specialist drop in session and support for people in the LGBT community with mental health issues. Loss of these services will potentially lead to an increase in risk taking sexual behaviour and reduced access to sexual health services for those people in the LGBT community with mental health conditions. In turn this will potentially increase the strain on other providers of sexual health and mental health services.

Learning Disabilities

Derbyshire Friend work with people in the LGBT community who have learning disabilities. This can often be a high risk group who are at risk of sexual exploitation and engage in sexual risk taking behaviour but are less likely to access mainstream services due to lack of understanding around sexual health, sexuality and learning disabilities. Derbyshire Friend provides support, awareness and education around sexual health and safeguarding for service users/carers and often facilitate access to other mainstream sexual health services.

HIV & Other Long-Term Conditions

This is unique support around sexual health and navigating the barriers to accessing mainstream sexual health services, which are often not well prepared for understanding the sexual health needs of this user group. This support is not offered by any other local organisation and loss of this service would result in service users having to travel to Manchester or London to seek equivalent support. Women Derbyshire Friend do focused work supporting the needs of lesbian and bisexual women. This work includes specialist information and support, sign-posting/referral and provision of Women's Safer Sex Packs. Lesbian and bisexual women are less likely to feel they need to access sexual health services due to assumption made by service providers and society over the sexual health needs of this group. STI transmission still takes place between women, and many lesbian and bisexual women are likely to have had a male sexual partner in their lives. There are no other equivalent local services for lesbian and bisexual women. Loss of these services would have a significant and direct negative impact on the LGBT community, as well as a negative impact on the profile of LGBT issues in the broader public and connected organisations. Derbyshire Friend are viewed as an example of excellent practice and source of specialist knowledge on LGBT issues across the region and there is currently no other equivalent organisation in Derby/Derbyshire that is able to provide equivalent support, specialist knowledge and education for those organisations receiving training on LGBT awareness/issues.

- New diagnoses among MSM continued to rise and reached an all time high of 3,250 in 2012.
- This reflects both on-going high levels of HIV transmission and an increase in HIV testing. This indicates that the work being done is effective yet there is a lot still to be done.
- Almost half diagnosed at first test Indicator that many who require an HIV test is yet to seek one.
- 29% of MSM newly diagnosed with HIV had concurrent acute STI compared to 11 % Heterosexual Men and 9% Heterosexual Women

- **Derbyshire Friend Sexual Health Survey. Where do people get condoms from? 52.9% LGBT Pub and Club, 41.8% Derbyshire Friend, 21.6% GUM and 11.8% Sauna. Derbyshire Friend distributes condoms weekly to the pub and club and sauna so without DF this facility will also go. When asked if having

to pay for condoms would cause them to use condoms less, 33% (1/3) of respondents stated that they would use condoms less with 46.4% Of those who had Unprotected Anal Intercourse in last 12 months said that they would use condoms less if they had to pay for them.

- In the last 12 months how many times have you had Unprotected Anal Intercourse (UAI) 54% Have had UAI in last 12 months.
- 50% of those who had UAI in last 12 months said that they did so due to factors other than being with a regular partner.
- The Top reasons being due to: Drug and Alcohol intake, Feels better without a condom, Felt very upset or going through a bad time and that they got carried away in the heat of the moment
- 64% reported not regularly going to GUM with 24.5% never attending GUM services.
- When asked where individuals get their sexual health information from: 53.1 % said Derbyshire Friend, 44% stated online with 24% stating GUM and only 4% stating CASH.

- 36.7% of gay men reported never having an HIV test yet only 8.1% said they didn't know where to go for a test. This highlights additional barriers to testing to be overcome.
